Appropriations

Through the Congressman's assignment on the House Appropriations Committee, he has secured the following successes for the State of Hawai'i:

119th Congress (to date)

- Voted YES on [H.R. 1263, the Strengthening the Quad Act](#). It directs the Department of State to seek to establish a working group with Japan, Australia, and India to facilitate closer cooperation on shared interests and values. The bill also requires the State Department to report to Congress a strategy for bolstering engagement and cooperation with the Quad.
- Voted YES on [H.R. 4216, the Made-in-America Defense Act](#). This bill requires the Department of State to conduct an annual review to identify defense articles and services eligible to be sold only through Foreign Military Sales (FMS) (i.e., U.S. government to foreign government sales) that should also be eligible to be sold through Direct Commercial Sales (i.e., U.S. company to foreign government sales).
- Voted YES on Iran War Powers Resolutions (H.Con.Res. 38, H.Con.Res. 40, H.Con.Res. 75, H.Con.Res. 86, H.Con.Res.89). Would direct the President to remove United States Armed Forces from hostilities with Iran.
- Voted YES on [H.R. 2913, the Ukraine Support Act](#). Would provide assistance to Ukraine and certain European countries and establish penalties for Russia and certain foreign persons.

- Voted YES on [H.R. 3033, the Solidify Iran Sanctions Act of 2023](#). This bill eliminates a sunset clause in the Iran Sanctions Act of 1996.
- Voted NO on [H.R. 3334, the STOP CCP Act](#). This bill requires the President to impose visa- and property-blocking sanctions on any member of the Chinese Communist Party (CCP) Central Committee whom the President determines plays a significant role in developing or implementing policies that (1) violate the autonomy of Hong Kong; (2) harass or intimidate the people of Taiwan; or (3) contribute to the oppression of individuals or groups in China, including Uyghur Muslims. The President must also impose sanctions on the adult family members of such sanctioned persons.
- Voted YES on [H.R. 3774, the SHIP Act](#). This bill requires the President to impose visa- and property-blocking sanctions against foreign persons that knowingly transport, process, refine, or otherwise deal in petroleum and petroleum products (including petrochemicals) originating in Iran.

- Voted NO on [H.R. 4691, the Iran Sanctions Relief Review Act of 2023](#). This bill restricts the President's authority to unilaterally undertake certain actions with respect to Iran and increases congressional oversight of those actions.
- Voted YES on [H.R. 5375, the Strengthening the Quad Act](#). Directs the Department of State to seek to establish a working group with Japan, Australia, and India to facilitate closer cooperation on shared interests and values. The bill also requires the State Department to report to Congress a strategy for bolstering engagement and cooperation with the Quad.
- Voted YES on [H.R. 5856, the Frederick Douglass Trafficking Victims Prevention and Protection Reauthorization Act of 2023](#).
- Voted YES on [H.Res. 771](#), Standing with Israel as it defends itself against the barbaric war launched by Hamas and other terrorists.
- Voted NO on [H.R. 5947, to provide for the rescission of certain waivers and licenses relating to Iran](#). This bill terminates the presidential waiver of certain sanctions on Iran and the licenses issued by the Department of the Treasury that allowed for the transfer of previously blocked Iranian funds (namely, the approximately \$6 billion of Iranian funds that the Biden Administration permitted to be transferred from restricted accounts in South Korea to restricted accounts in Qatar to facilitate the release of five U.S. citizens detained in Iran). Furthermore, the President may not exercise waiver authority related to certain accounts belonging to Iran.
- Voted YES on [H.R. 5961, No Funds for Iranian Terrorism Act](#). This bill requires the President to impose property-blocking sanctions on foreign financial institutions and international financial institutions that process, participate in, or facilitate a transaction involving certain Iranian funds (namely, the approximately \$6 billion of Iranian funds that the Biden administration permitted to be transferred from restricted accounts in South Korea to restricted accounts in Qatar to facilitate the release of five U.S. citizens detained in Iran).
- Voted YES on [H.Res. 793](#), Calling on Hamas to immediately release hostages taken during October 2023 attack on Israel.
- Voted NO on [H.R. 6046, Standing Against Houthi Aggression Act](#). This bill requires the Department of State to designate Ansarallah as a foreign terrorist organization and the President to impose property- and visa-blocking sanctions with respect to Ansarallah and any foreign person who is a member, agent, or affiliate of, or owned or controlled by Ansarallah.
- Voted NO on [H.R. 6323, Iran Counterterrorism Act of 2023](#). This bill modifies the authority of the President to waive restrictions on certain U.S. accounts of foreign financial institutions that have facilitated significant financial transactions on behalf of the Central Bank of Iran, certain Iranian financial institutions, or certain Iranian nationals.
- Voted YES on [H.Res. 883](#), Expressing the sense of the House of Representatives that the slogan, "from the river to the sea, Palestine will be free" is antisemitic and its use must be condemned.
- Voted YES on [H.Res. 888](#), Reaffirming the State of Israel's right to exist.
- Voted PRESENT on [H.Res. 894](#), Strongly condemning and denouncing the drastic rise of antisemitism in the United States and around the world.
- Voted YES on [H.Res. 966](#), Condemning rape and sexual violence committed by Hamas in its war against Israel.

- Voted YES on [H.Res 1143](#), Condemning Iran's unprecedented drone and missile attack on Israel.
- Voted YES on [H.R. 8038, 21st Century Peace through Strength Act](#).
- Voted NO on [H.R. 8282, the Illegitimate Court Counteraction Act](#). This bill imposes sanctions against foreign persons (individuals and entities) who assist the International Criminal Court (ICC) in investigating, arresting, detaining, or prosecuting certain individuals.
- Voted NO on [H.R. 8369, the Israel Security Assistance Support Act](#). This bill specifies that no federal funds may be used to withhold, halt, reverse, or cancel the delivery of defense articles or defense services to Israel. Also, no funds may be used to pay the salary of any Department of Defense (DOD) or Department of State employee who acts to limit defense deliveries to Israel.
- Voted YES on [H.Res.1449](#), Condemning the global rise of antisemitism and calling upon countries and international bodies to counter antisemitism.
- Voted YES on [H.R. 9668, SHIELD Against CCP Act](#). This bill establishes within the Department of Homeland Security (DHS) a working group to assess and improve efforts to address security threats posed to the United States by the Chinese Communist Party (CCP).
- Voted NO on [H.Res 1469](#), Ensuring accountability for key officials in the Biden-Harris administration responsible for decisionmaking and execution failures throughout the withdrawal from Afghanistan.

117th Congress

- Voted YES on [H.Res. 130](#), Condemning the continued violation of rights and freedoms of the people of Hong Kong by the People's Republic of China and the Government of the Hong Kong Special Administrative Region.
- Voted YES on [H.Res. 134](#), Condemning the military coup that took place on February 1, 2021, in Burma and the Burmese military detention of civilian leaders and calling for the release of all those detained and for those elected to serve in Parliament to resume their duties.
- Voted YES on [H.Res. 317](#), Condemning the ongoing genocide and crimes against humanity being committed against Uyghurs and members of other religious and ethnic minority groups by the People's Republic of China.

This bill directs the United States to implement a strategy to strengthen global health security, including by requiring the President to create the Global Health Security Agenda Interagency Review Council to implement the Global Health Security Agenda.
- Voted YES on [H.R. 1155, the Uyghur Forced Labor Prevention Act](#). This bill imposes various restrictions related to China's Xinjiang Uyghur Autonomous Region, including by prohibiting certain imports from Xinjiang and imposing sanctions on those responsible for human rights violations there.
- Voted YES on [H.R. 1333, the NO BAN Act](#). This bill imposes limitations on the President's authority to suspend or restrict aliens from entering the United States. It also

prohibits religious discrimination in various immigration-related decisions, such as whether to issue an immigrant or nonimmigrant visa, unless there is a statutory basis for such discrimination.

- Voted YES on [H.R. 1456, the Peace Corps Reauthorization Act of 2022](#). This bill reauthorizes through FY2024 and modifies operations of the Peace Corps.
- Voted YES on [H.R. 3485, the Global Respect Act](#). This bill imposes visa-blocking sanctions on foreign persons responsible for or complicit in violating the human rights of individuals due to actual or perceived sexual orientation, gender identity, or sex characteristics.
- Voted YES on [H.R. 4133, the Caribbean Basin Security Initiative Authorization Act](#). This bill authorizes the allocation of certain funds for purposes related to the Caribbean Basin Security Initiative, requires the Department of State to develop a strategy for prioritizing efforts to increase disaster response and resilience in the Caribbean, and establishes monitoring and reporting requirements.
- Voted YES on [H.R. 4693, the Global Malnutrition Prevention and Treatment Act of 2021](#). This bill sets out programs and otherwise directs the U.S. Agency for International Development (USAID) to carry out activities to prevent and treat malnutrition globally.
- Voted YES on [H.R. 4785, the Uyghur Policy Act of 2021](#). This bill addresses human rights issues concerning the Uyghurs and other minority groups in the Xinjiang Uyghur Autonomous Region in China.
- Voted YES on [H.R. 5665, the Combating International Islamophobia Act](#). This bill establishes within the Department of State the Office to Monitor and Combat Islamophobia and addresses related issues.
