

U.S. Representative Ed Case Small Business Accomplishments (2019-2026)

As a former decades-long member of Hawaii's business community himself, Rep. Case has focused throughout his state and federal legislative career on championing our nation's and Hawaii's small businesses. In Congress (2002-2007, 2019-present), he has utilized his experience, positions and relationships to advance our small business community.

His primary position is the U.S. House Committee on Appropriations, responsible for all federal discretionary funding; he is serving his eighth year on Appropriations. He also served several years on the U.S. House Committee on Small Business and maintains strong relationships with that committee and his former committee members.

This document provides a summary of some of Rep. Case's legislative efforts and accomplishments on key bills, cosponsorships, votes, Appropriations funding, joint letters, statements, and congressional delegations that support national and Hawai'i small businesses.

Key Bills Introduced by Rep. Case

Rep. Case has introduced bills (proposed legislation) to advance key priorities for American small businesses (focusing on Hawaiian/Pacific Island business interests) and the nation's overall fiscal health. His legislation addresses structural, systemic barriers that small business faces.

This includes legislation to amend the Jones Act, which results in crippling shipping rates for Hawai'i businesses and consumers. It has also included legislation to improve economies and expand trade throughout the Indo-Pacific, and to assist Hawai'i to address crises such as COVID, Red Hil and the Maui wildfires. Key Cosponsorships

Rep. Case has consistently cosponsored legislation with colleagues across multiple Congresses to advance long-standing priorities for the support, protection, and promotion of America's small businesses and a healthily competitive economy (and in particular, for Hawai'i and the Indo-Pacific). Various of these proposals have been incorporated into other legislation that has passed into law or into regulations. As some examples:

18. [H.R. 4615](#), the Small Business Payment for Performance Act of 2025. This bill would amend the Small Business Act to provide interim partial payment to small business contractors that request an equitable adjustment due to a change in the terms of a construction contract.

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26. [H.R. 6662](#), the Transforming Hiring in Rural Industries and Vital Economies Act of 2023. This bill would establish a White House Rural Council (which would also aim to positively impact small businesses in these "Rural industries/economies"); the SBA Administrator would sit on this council.
27. [H.R. 6037](#), the Maui STRONG Act. This bill would direct the SBA Administrator to establish the Emergency Micro-enterprise Recovery Grant Pilot Program.

This bill would modify the WBC Program to enable the SBA to provide initial and continuation grants to eligible entities to operate women's business centers for the benefit of women-owned small businesses. The SBA must also publish standards for a program to accredit entities that receive grants from the WBC.

43. [H.R. 6450](#), the SCORE for Small Business Act of 2022. This bill would reauthorize through FY2023 the Service Corps of Retired Executives (SCORE) program, outlines the duties of the SCORE Association, and requires the SBA to cooperate with the association to carry out the program.

The credit was established to compensate employers whose businesses were negatively impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic for wages paid to their employees.
48. [H.R. 3207](#), the PREPARE Act. This bill reauthorizes through FY2026 a pre-disaster mitigation program, administered by the SBA, for disbursing economic injury disaster loans to small businesses for protection of real estate, equipment, inventory, supplies, and materials.
49. [H.R. 4697](#), to amend the Small Business Act to eliminate certain requirements relating to the award of construction subcontracts within the county or State of performance.

60. [H.R. 793](#), the RESTAURANTS Act of 2021. This bill would establish a \$120,000,000,000 Restaurant Revitalization Fund to provide structured relief to food service or drinking establishments. It was limited to smaller restaurant business with a maximum revenue cap of eligibility.

63. [H. Res. 712](#), This resolution supports the designation of National Co-Op Month, commends the cooperative business model for its contributions to the economy, and expresses confidence in cooperatives to continue their successes.
